## Sabres, Barons girls prepare for playoffs

The Springfield Sabres remarkable improvement in the 2023-24 MWHSHL season has earned them home-ice advantage in their first-round series with the JH Bruns Broncos.

Fans are encouraged to pack the house in Oakbank on Feb. 26 at 3:30 p.m. Following a Feb. 28 game in Southdale, a third game, if necessary, is slated for Oakbank on Feb. 29 at 3:30 p.m.

Coach Natasha Kostenko's club finished with a 12-10 record and a onepoint advantage over the Broncos. All three regularseason matchups were onegoal affairs, with Springfield going 1-2. They beat the Broncos 2-1 in their latest matchup on Feb. 5.

Kostenko said the two clubs are very similar. Statistically, they are close, too. Both were plus-six in goal differential. While Springfield scored 19 fewer times, they also gave up 19 fewer. "We won our last two games, which put us one point up on JH Bruns," Kostenko said. "It gives us home-ice advantage, which is awesome. That is exciting; it's been a while since we've been up there in the standings. It's been really exciting for the girls. All their hard work is paying off."

The Sabres are a strong defensive club; their 41 goals allowed were the second-fewest in the division. Kostenko credits a veteran defence, backchecking forwards and a solid goal-tender in Grace Wozney. The Sabres' only netminder, Wozney, posted an 11-9 record with five shutouts, a 1.79 goals-against average,

and a .917 save percentage. They also have some scoring prowess. Leading scorer Alexis Campbell, a veteran of the AAA Dauphin and La Broquerie Habs programs, scored 10 goals and added eight assists in 22 games. Lily Hurley was

close behind with 10 goal

and five helpers.

Campbell said the season started slowly, with five consecutive losses. The club kept working in practice, and the new players got accustomed to the systems and, in some cases, the game of hockey itself.

Some players had never played hockey before. Early practices were spent working on basic systems, shooting and passing. Campbell said the veterans helped their new mates with the fundamentals. Over time, that hard work paid off.

"We improved a lot," Campbell observed. "We're building as a team and are coming together really well.

"After our first win, we were so happy. Our confidence was boosted, and we kept winning. Our confidence was through the roof. When you're confident, you play better."

It was also an adjustment period for the coach. Kostenko began the season with modest goals. She allowed time for players to adjust to her and for her to adjust to the players. Early sessions were a test of what worked and what did not.

"Ultimately, it's the girls' hard work that's led to our success this year," Kostenko said. "If they weren't dedicated and they weren't nake them have effort. I can't make them have effort. At the end of the day, it's the desire of your team. Our team definitely has the desire to win; they want to be the best they can be every game."

The seventh-place École Edward Schreyer Barons (3-17) are also in the quarterfinals as they take on second-place Murdoch Mackay. The two teams played three times this season, with Murdoch winning each time.

Serena Gorski led the team with 12 goals, four assists and 16 points. Lauren Ingeberg chipped in with five scores.

Emily Kay was a stalwart in net. Facing an average of more than 38 shots per game, Kay posted an .899 save percentage. In her second game of the season, Kay stopped 53 shots in 50 minutes of regulation, 10 more in overtime and 14 in a shootout to earn the Barons their first-ever point in a 2-2 tie with the Beliveau Barracudas.
