## Beausejour alumni donate to school, community

Beausejour grads had a 50-year high school reunion this summer where alumni reunited, broke bread and donated funds to their school and community.

Classes of 1973 and 1974
held a reunion with various
activities throughout the
weekend. Approximately
110 people attended and
took in a Friday night mix
and mingle along with golf
at Rivers Edge and dinner
at Great Woods Saturday.
Sunday wrapped up with
the Shades of the Past Show
and Shine, a viewing of the
photo history wall at DC
Accounting, the Beau-Head
Arts Fest and a final farewell at Train Whistle Park.

The former students also

had the chance to visit École Edward Schreyer School (ESS) and tour the halls of their alma mater. Beause-jour Senior School was renamed in 1979 to recognize the accomplishments of the former Brokenhead resident who went on to be Premier of Manitoba and Governor General of Canada.

The reunion classmates also made several donations including \$350 and 165 pounds of non-perishable food items to the Beausejour Food Bank and a \$200 donation to Beausejour Active Transportation for a commemorative brick at Train Whistle Park back in October.

With ESS raising funds to replace the school gymnasium score clock, the reunion committee made a \$2,444.56 donation towards the purchase of a new score-board in November. The funds were proceeds from the reunion.

Reunion Committee member Janet Hill said the group agreed that any surplus funds should remain in the community and be utilised in a way that would ensure the widest and most meaningful impact. They also wanted the youth to benefit in some way.

"We heard about the ESS Gym Fund for a new score clock and thought our school experience is what brought us all together on reunion weekend, so why not give back to the school," Hill said. "That school contribution plus the donation to the Food Bank and the Beausejour Active Transportation sponsorship seemed the right way to give back."

"We are extremely thankful that the grads of 73 and 74 chose to support our fundraising efforts," said ESS vice principal Jaymi Witzke. "I do think the best part, however, was the time they spent chatting with our student athletes about what an impact sports had made on their lives. The gym truly is a place where so many of our students make those lasting memories."
