SCI microbiologist earns prestigious scholarship

A Springfield Collegiate (SCI) graduating student's dream of becoming a microbiologist recently became much easier after receiving a prestigious scholarship.

Larry Denisiuk earned a BMO: Leader of Tomorrow Scholarship from the University of Manitoba. It provides \$16,000 over four years of study. Only nine are given each year.

Denisiuk learned about the scholarship on SCI's website. After reading the criteria, he decided to try his luck. The process was short but involved. Denisiuk had to apply by Dec. 1, 2023. He first answered online questions about his goals, work history and experience in various situations. After making the short-

Denisiuk had a series of interviews. He toured the University of Manitoba and met with university officials.

"Then came the big interview," Denisiuk said. "You were in a room with all five panellists, and each panellist gave you a very deep question to answer. You only had 15 minutes to finish each question, and there was no extra time. I was pretty scared because I was the first to go, but I did very well and was calm and collected."

"After the interviews, I found out on March 8 through email that I was selected to receive the scholarship!"

Denisiuk admitted to being shocked because he was declined for other awards. He said he was proud to receive it. So was his family, who threw a small party. Then it was back to work.

"I didn't focus too much on it, but rather, I focused on applying for more scholarships and bursaries," Denisiuk said. "I don't cling to good and bad news for a long time; I focus on what needs to get done."

The award allows Denisiuk to attend his top university choice. He said the University of Manitoba is close to home, culturally diverse and offers a variety of programs. It also boasts the Medical Microbiology and Infectious Disease Program.

"Their microbiology program is one of the best in Canada, and they have their very own department for microbiology," Denisiuk explained. "The U of M has countless co-op programs that you can apply for to earn while you learn. You can even work at the National Microbiology Laboratory in downtown Winnipeg, where I would want to work after my postsecondary schooling. The cost of tuition is very man-

Denisiuk has been working for years to reach this moment. In 2022, he earned a two-week internship at the International Institute for Sustainable Development's Experimental Lakes Area (ELA). That experience deepened his desire to pursue microbiology. Denisiuk knows he wants to help the environment and conduct research in the lab and field. "I also gained a deep-
